Leaving with a Heavy Heart

Our former minister Rev Stewart Gillan and several other Christian workers were airlifted home from Israel 2 weeks ago, following the outbreak of violent hostilities between Hamas and Israel. Stewart reports very mixed feelings on leaving parishioners, partners, friends and colleagues behind – some choosing to stay but many having no choice.

Stewart posts regularly on Facebook and has started a blog. His first blog post includes several suggestions for prayer and concludes "Through these days, may we be to each other in the

power of the Holy Spirit, strength in need, comfort in sorrow, and companions on this journey of spiritual communion and mission partnership with our friends and colleagues in Israel and Palestine".







Grateful thanks from West Lothian Foodbank to everyone who helped with the Harvest Collection. So many people were involved - the Sunday Club youngsters brought donations, as did many members of the congregation, lots of willing helpers brought everything down from the church to the hall where another team packed 331Kg (the equivalent of 788 meals) into crates, ready for the Foodbank to pick up the next day. In addition, lots of people opted to give money and of the £1027 donated, more than £500 was subject to Gift Aid. A wonderful, generous response to help people in West Lothian.

Worship with a difference

Crown Work Continues

Work is progressing well with the repairs to our Crown of Thorns spire. All the old cladding has been removed and as you can see the rotten timber sections are being cut out and new timber spliced in with epoxy resin adhesives, held in place by carbon fibre rods (and temporary wooden battens!). Excitingly, the contractor is also now starting to fix the new gold cladding.

However the recent bad weather has been delaying the work, and it is now unlikely to be completed until late December or early January.





Aspire Linlithgow: Stage 2

So far, the Aspire Linlithgow campaign has mostly worked on fundraising for the Crown of Thorns repair work. With that largely completed, our Fundraising Team are turning their attention to resourcing the plans to transform Cross House into a warm and welcoming community hub and to address fabric issues in the church building – water problems amongst others.

With a potential price tag for Cross House of over £3 million, they will primarily seek to attract major grant funding from sources such as the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF). Fundraising Team leader Alan Miller says "The process of gaining NLHF funding is very involved and lengthy – but if we can win their support, others are likely to follow".


Service of Memory and Thanksgiving

Organ Spectacular

Our own organist, Dr John Willmett, takes centre stage as he plays a solo recital at the next Occasionally@St Michael's recital on **Sunday 26th November at 3pm.**

Alongside other German and English composers, John's wide-ranging programme will include a Fantasia by Mozart and will conclude with Bach's mighty Fugue in Eb major. It's often referred to as the 'St Anne' Fugue as the start of the

main theme closely resembles the hymn tune of that name (think "O God, our help in ages past"). What Bach makes of this theme, in a piece he composed 'for the recreation of the spirit', is stunning and well worth an hour of your Sunday afternoon.

Give thanks for those who volunteer with groups in the church, and pray for them. In particular give thanks for those who work to keep children and vulnerable adults safe in all we do.



Friday

Pray for the Crosswind team who work tirelessly to produce our magazine. Pray for those in the congregation for whom this is now their main source of information and contact with the life of the church.

Saturday

Pray for the festival of Christmas Trees from 1- 3 December. Give thanks for those who organise it. Pray that many will come. This is a wonderful opportunity to attract people to the church who do not normally attend.
