


Introducing our new Pioneer and Outreach Worker



Following recent interviews, we're delighted that Lorraine Orr has accepted the post of Pioneer and Outreach Worker with St Michael's. Subject to PVG verification, she will start in post early in November.

Hi

I'm Lorraine Orr, but a lot of people from Linlithgow will know me as Lorraine Kidd. My husband Chris and I were born and brought up in Linlithgow. We were married in St Michael's in 2012 and our wee girl Katie was christened here in 2017. I have been a member of St Michael's since I was 15 years old and have previously been crèche leader, Sunday school helper and YF helper.

I have been involved in the town's community projects for as long as I can remember (Gala Day, LYPP and Guides to name a few).

For the last 2 and half years I have worked for St John's Church as their Children and Families Worker in the town. Previous to that I worked in the Church of Scotland offices at 121 George Street: that included time working on "Church without Walls" (Fresh Expressions).

I am really looking forward to the 2030 vision and being part of this journey.

The Linlithgow Peace Garden

The recent Black Bitch magazine included a proposal for the Linlithgow Peace Garden. First imagined by Rev Stewart Gillan and others after visiting the Middle East, it was initially to be in the Manse Garden at the top of Kirkgate.

Movement to the Rose Garden will maximise access for all and help preserve the Rose Garden itself, following a planned refurbishment.

It also means that Liam's garden will be undisturbed for future vegetable growing and BBQs!

The plan is for the community to take over the care of the Burgh Halls garden, in place of Council support which is severely restricted by budget constraints. This will require fund raising and a gardening team, but gives the opportunity of involving younger people (following Royal Horticultural Society guidance) to support improving mental health and counter loneliness.

World Polio Day 2020

World Polio Day is held on 24 October every year to increase awareness of this terrible disease which can kill or cause severe disability due to paralysis. Rotary International, in collaboration with the World Health Organisation, launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1985 for the worldwide vaccination of children. Thirty-five years on, and now only two countries report cases of the wild polio

virus – Afghanistan and Pakistan. Rotary's End Polio Now programme will continue until these countries are free of the disease.

To mark World Polio Day in Linlithgow, in cooperation with the Rotary Club of Linlithgow Grange we will be illuminating St Michael's Crown of Thorns in purple, so look out for a subtle change in its appearance in late October. Why purple? Because of the purple-coloured dye painted on the little finger of a child to signify they have received the potentially life-saving polio vaccine.

Christian Aid Autumn Appeal

When crisis arrived on our doorsteps this year, neighbourly love helped us through the shortages of flour, bread and toilet paper and many of us were worried for family and friends. However, around the world, panic-buying was far from the only cause of problems. Millions face extreme shortages because huge areas of land had the worst locust swarms in many years meaning virtually no harvest, while others experienced severe flooding, civil war, extreme poverty and homelessness. Covid-19 on top of this has meant many do

not have access to health care services. Often the poor and the persecuted are the first to suffer - and to suffer disproportionately.

Christian Aid usually runs a door to door appeal in May but were unable to this year because of Covid-19. They are now seeking to make up much-needed funds. As we looked out for the vulnerable in our communities this year, so Christian Aid are running an Autumn Appeal to help the vulnerable worldwide.
